## 1. Call to order and Introductions:

Chairman DaRos called the meeting to order at 10:07 a.m. All present introduced themselves.

## 2. Presentation: C-MED Report:

C-MED Executive Director Gary Stango gave an overview of C-MED operations.

## 3. Presentation: CT Rides:

Amanda Brown introduced herself and explained the role of CT Rides which was awarded a state contract replacing Rideworks.

## 4. Presentation: DESSP

Bob Kenny, Acting Coordinator for Region 2, reported on staff issues and that work is progressing on greater coordination between utilities and local public works departments to keep roads open during a weather

emergency. A Statewide Exercise is scheduled for July 28-31, 2012. All towns are being asked to participate in two of the four days of the Statewide Exercise.

## 5. Adoption of May 23, 2012 SCRCOG meeting minutes:

Chairman DaRos presented the minutes. First Selectman Sheehy moved that the minutes as presented on pages 3-5 of the agenda packet be approved. Mayor Maturoa seconded the motion. It was approved unanimously.

## 6. Treasurer's Report for month ending March 31, 2012:

First Selectman Freda presented the Treasurer's Report which is found on pages 6 and 7 of the agenda packet. Our balance sheet shows that we have \$432,334 in cash and investments and \$309,335 due from CT DOT for transportation planning. Expenses seemed appropriate for the month. Mayor Maturo moved for acceptance of the Treasurer's Report. First Selectman Sheehy seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

## 7. Transportation Committee Report:

Mayor Dickinson presented the Transportation Committee Report contained on pages 8-19 of the agenda packet. Mayor Dickinson moved the approval of 2010-2013 TIP Amendment Twenty-Seven. Mayor Maturo seconded the motion. It passed unanimously. Mayor Dickinson moved for the approval of 2012-2015 TIP Amendment Four. First Selectman Mazza seconded the motion. It passed unanimously. Mayor Dickinson moved for the approval of FY 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 UPWP. Mayor Maturo seconded the motion. It passed unanimously.

## 8. Adopt Resolution Authorizing the Execution of Agreements with CTDOT

First Selectman Sheehy moved for approval of the Resolution on page 20 of the agenda packet. Mayor Maturo seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

## 9. Approve Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Meriden and SCRCOG

Mayor Maturo moved for approval of the Memorandum of Understanding shown on pages 21-33 of the agenda packet. First Selectman Zeoli seconded the motion. It was approved unanimously.

## 10. Public Participation, Outreach, Title VI Request

Senior Transportation Planner Stephen Dudley explained that this was an information item seeking assistance from the member towns in identifying those organizations which could be utilized to expand outreach to all segments of the community. The outreach effort is explained further on page 34 of the agenda packet.

## 11. Adopt the FY 2012-13 SCRCOG Budget

Chairman DaRos noted that since the joint Executive/ Personnel Committees made no recommendation today, this matter will be deferred to the next SCRCOG meeting.

## 12. Congressional Report:

Louis Mangini, Legislative Aide to U.S. Representative Rosa DeLauro, noted that the latest temporary Transportation reauthorization will expire at the end of June. There will probably be another short term extension. It appears that rather than shutting post offices, rural facilities will cut hours to trim the Post Office budget. The Wallingford sorting facility should be funded at least through 2014. It is expected that block grants to states and cities will be cut.

## 13. State Legislative Report:

Executive Director Amento distributed and reviewed a list of bills approved by the General Assembly of interest to the region and its municipalities.

## 14. SCROG Executive Director's Report:

Executive Director Amento noted that there are 12 UPWP transportation studies that will be undertaken in the next fiscal year for our member towns. The budget for the studies is \$515,000. The RFQ for consultants is out and interviews will be conducted on June 19th. Stephen Dudley is serving on a statewide Corridor Study Focus Group organized by CTDOT. A Regional Hazard Mitigation Advisory Group, made up of representatives of the member towns, had its first meeting as work begins on the FEMA grant.

## 15. **REX Development Report:**

Executive Director Ginny Kozlowski's report is on page 40 of the agenda packet.

## 16. **RPC Action Table for May:**

The Action Table was reviewed.

## 17. Regional Cooperation/ Other Business:

None

## 18. Adjournment:

Mayor Maturo moved for adjournment. First Selectman Mazza seconded the motion and all approved. The meeting adjourned at 11:15 a.m.

Whereas: U.S. Department of Transportation "Metropolitan Planning Regulations" (23 CFR 450) prescribe that each metropolitan planning organization maintain a financially constrained multi-modal transportation improvement program consistent with a State Implementation Plan for Air Quality (SIP) conforming to both U.S. Environmental Protection Administration-established air quality guidelines and SIP-established mobile source emissions budgets; and

Whereas: The Council, on January 25, 2012, indicated that periodic *Program* adjustment or amendment was possible; and

Whereas: Projects referenced in the Program amendment (below) are consistent with the region's long-range transportation plan (South Central Regional Long Range Transportation Plan—2011 to 2040, (April, 2011); and

Whereas: Council Public Participation Guidelines: Transportation Planning have been observed during the development of the proposed Program amendment (below); and

Whereas: By agreement between the Council and the Connecticut Department of Transportation, public involvement activities carried out by the South Central Regional Council of Governments in response to U.S. Department of Transportation metropolitan planning requirements are intended to satisfy the requirements associated with development of a Statewide Transportation Improvement Program and/or its amendment; and

Whereas: Council of Governments' review of transportation goals, projects and opportunities may result in further adjustment or amendment of the *Program*.

Dear Mr. Taylor:

I am pleased to submit to you South Central Connecticut's 2008 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) annual update for 2012, which is to be the final annual update before the five-year comprehensive update for 2013. In addition to this letter, the annual update consists of the attached "CEDS Goals & Objectives Implementation Progress Report", the "2012 CEDS Regional Projects" list and the "2012 CEDS Regional Brownfields Projects" list.

Over the past year, Connecticut, as well as the region, has seen an encouraging uptick in economic growth and unemployment decline. The Connecticut May 2012 total nonfarm job estimate increased by 1,400 jobs, or 0.1% to 1,629,600. Over the past year, the state labor market has grown by 6,200 jobs, or 0.4%. Although job growth has gone up and down from month to month over the past year, Connecticut's large employment fluctuations experienced since the beginning of the year appear to be driven by unusual seasonal patterns rather than purely economic forces. The first five months of 2012 have produced a job growth of 6,100 positions for the state which is just below 2011's January-May employment buildup of 7,700 positions. This is consistent with most forecasts which project continued slow, but positive recovery in the state. Although the unemployment for the State is still unexpectedly high at 7.8%, it is down from 8.9% this time last year and has decreased steadily from month to month. The South Central Region unemployment rate at 8.5% for the month of May, however, is slightly above both the State and the Nation (8.2%). It has, however, also decreased from this time last year when it was at 9.4%.

This slow but steady growth has seen Connecticut and the South Central region make a slight headway from the recession, as seen over the course of the past year. Connecticut has now recovered 34,900, or 29.7%, of the 117,500 total nonfarm jobs lost in the March 2008 – February 2010 recessionary period. The private sector has now regained 43,600 (39.6%) of the 110,200 private jobs lost in the recessionary downturn. Although, financial activities, other services, and government have continued to lose jobs even after the recovery began in February 2010. Last month, however, total private employment declined slightly (down 200, less than 0.05%) as government had a large gain (1,600, 0.7%). Since this time last year, the private sector has added 9,900 positions (0.7%) state wide, while overall nonfarm employment is running at a somewhat slower pace (6,200, 0.4%). With this in mind, I am pleased to report the encouraging

127 Washington Avenue, 4th FL West, North Haven, CT 06473 T 203 821 3682 F 203 821 3683 www.rexdevelopment.org successes the region has made over the past year in implementing the CEDS agenda, while continuing to work toward a more stabilized and sustainable economic future.

The "CEDS Goals & Objectives Implementation Progress Report" included with this update reviews the progress made on each of the CEDS goals and objectives during the past year and outlines the next steps that will be taken. The "2012 CEDS Regional Projects" report updates the roster of regional capital projects aimed at fulfilling the CEDS goals, noting which projects have been completed or moved into construction phases and adding new projects that have been planned during the previous year. As done in 2011, each project listed as "ready to go" in 2012 was given a priority ranking (score), that is based on the priority investments of the Economic Development Administration as well as the objectives for the South Central Connecticut's CEDS. In 2012, four new projects were added to the "ready to go" list, including two business incubators, one being a renewable energy incubator associated with the University of New Haven, both projected to create over 150 jobs. Over the course of the past year, two projects were also moved from the "in planning" stage to "ready to go", including a redevelopment site in the City of New Haven projected to create over 1,450 jobs.

As you will see from the Goals and Objectives Report, the region has continued to implement key priorities for economic prosperity, and will need to continue implementation and take in to account the priorities that were not accomplished when developing the new five-year strategy. Over the past year, REX Development has continued to build collaboration with the public and private sectors in the region, instituting a new social media campaign and expanding on the communications work plan. REX Development has sponsored and been a part of multiple educational and networking opportunities for both the municipalities and private sector throughout the region, which has garnered additional support from these groups as well as a commitment from EDA in support of the update to the five-year comprehensive economic development strategy. This support has been and will be effective in developing a strategy that recognizes all voices in the region and builds upon past success, while envisioning future sustainability.

The region has had much success over the past year that has been a direct result of the vision identified in the goals and objectives. Some examples have included a \$5 million federal grant to the regional Workforce Alliance for workforce training related to STEM jobs; development of a regional "ROOF" program to combat foreclosures in the region; and the collaboration of multiple entities on building an innovation HUB for the newly created innovation ecosystem in the State of Connecticut. These accomplishments are just small examples of the overall vision of the 16 objectives laid out in the 2008 CEDS, and a driving force behind the establishment of a new five year plan.

Although the region continues to make progress towards a more sustainable future through aforementioned efforts, the region is still suffering from the slow recovery of the recession, as previously described. After seeing a steady decline in unemployment, it is still high, with the urban core City of New Haven having an unemployment rate of 11.6% for the month of May, well above the 7.8% and 8.2% of the State and Nation respectively. While there has been some openings and prospective job growth in the region over the past year, for example the new arrival of the Alexion pharmaceutical corporate headquarters, they have been combated with continued

closings that have affected the region as a whole, including the closing of the New Haven Register effecting over 100 jobs, and the closing of the Unilever plant in the adjacent municipality of Clinton effecting nearly 200 jobs in the region. As a result of the slowed recovery, the municipalities continue to make significant cuts in order to circumvent deficits caused by the lagging effects.

With the continuing slow recovery of the economy and paralleled governmental cutbacks, it is now more important than ever for the region to focus on collaborative efforts in economic development. The State of Connecticut's Office of Program Management reinstituted in 2012 the Regional Improvement Program, to incentivize municipalities and regional entities to work together to achieve cost reduction and increase purchasing power. The South Central Connecticut region applied for three of these grants to improve the efficiency of services while reducing the cost to regional municipalities, an example being the development of a regional Geographic Information System. As seen in years past, the importance of regionalization has been realized by the State through distinguished economic development districts, which led the way for the South Central region, in 2012, becoming the first federally recognized Economic Development District in the State of Connecticut by the United States Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration.

The South Central Connecticut region is moving into the final year of this CEDS process. While still waning from the effects of the economic recession, as previously mentioned, we are encouraged by the progress we have made to date in implementing this important economic development strategy. As we will continue our efforts in this process, we are also currently in the process of developing a new five-year CEDS for South Central Connecticut. Our region is working together now more than ever, progress is being made, momentum is shifting in our favor, and we now need to continue with these efforts.

We appreciate EDA's continued partnership in our efforts to help South Central Connecticut prosper during these trying times. EDA's support has always been critical to our efforts and we look forward to continuing our important work together.

All projects are presented at quarterly roundtable sessions and scored on project readiness to determine if the project is "ready to go" or "in planning." As projects are determined "ready to go" they are then evaluated and scored based on **priority investments** of EDA as well as priority investments of the South Central Connecticut Region.

## Summary of FY2012-2013 SCRCOG Budget June 27, 2012

## The 2012-2013 Proposed SCRCOG Budget proposes:

- No municipal dues increase. SCRCOG dues rate is the lowest among the 15 Regional Planning Organizations in the state.
- The proposed SCRCOG budget for 2012-13 totals \$1,577,519. Operating expenses total \$791,800, and planning studies and the FEMA grant will result in expenditures of \$720,750.
- Total operating expenses show an increase of only \$12,400 or 1.6% over the current year and an increase of only \$25,507 or 3.3% since the 2009-2010 FY.
- The proposed budget contains an increased and more diversified revenue stream with the addition of two federal grants—HUD Sustainable Communities Regional Planning Grant and FEMA Hazard Mitigation Planning Grant---adding \$234,000 to our revenues.
- Proposed salary increases of \$9,331 represent only a 2.2% increase over the current year's salaries. Salary adjustments totaling \$9,500 are also proposed. Municipal dues only pay, at the most, 10% of these increases and adjustments or \$1,883. Staff salaries will be partially funded by \$28,450 of the federal grants obtained by SCRCOG, reducing the draw upon municipal dues and federal transportation funds.
- Health and dental costs decreased a total of \$4,900 for next year. Our high deductible/health savings account plan will cost SCRCOG \$48,000 (31%) less than our 2009-2010 health benefits costs. We are proposing the addition of a long term disability plan for our employees which will only cost \$2,300 per year. With the addition of the disability plan our employees will have a benefits package comparable to that offered by the other Regional Planning Organizations in Connecticut. The dental plan was introduced in FY2010-11. We are now proposing an employee contribution of 10% for the dental plan. In the current year, there was no employee contribution. The employee contribution to the health insurance plan was increased from 7 to 10% in FY 2010-11.

- General overhead expenses are proposed to be reduced by \$5,700 as a result of elimination of rental of a postage machine (we are using stamps) and lower liability insurance, workers compensation, audit and legal expenses.
- There are no capital expenses planned for next year. \$30,200 was budgeted and spent in the current budget year on computer and server upgrades.
- Next year's Unified Planning Work Program will fund \$515,000 in transportation studies for the benefit of our member cities and towns.
- Next year, we expect to expend \$205,750 in FEMA grant funds producing a Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan for the 10 communities in our region who did not already have such a plan. Having a plan in place makes the cities and towns and the region eligible for FEMA project grants to eliminate or mitigate identified hazards.
- SCRCOG is awaiting notice of whether it will receive either or both of the state Regional Performance Grants it applied for in December of 2011. The applications were for: (1) a Regional Web-Based Geographic Information System (GIS)--\$591,028; and (2) an Inter-Municipal Shared Services Feasibility Study--\$54,581.
