NOTE: The June SCRCOG Board meeting was a virtual meeting facilitated by Zoom due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

1. Call to order and Introductions

Chairman Heller called the meeting to order at 10:02 a.m. All present introduced themselves.

2. Adoption of May 27, 2020 SCRCOG Meeting Minutes

First Selectman Hoey presented the Minutes of the SCRCOG Meeting of May 27, 2020, which were included in the agenda packet at pages 2-4. First Selectman Hoey moved for their approval. First Selectman Cofrancesco seconded the motion, with all voting in favor.

3. Treasurer's Report for Month Ending May 31, 2020

First Selectman Zeoli presented the Treasurer's Report for the month ending May 31, 2020, which was included in the agenda packet at pages 5-6. The Balance Sheet shows that SCRCOG has total assets of \$1,403,000 with \$1,223,000 of that in cash and investments. There is also \$140,000 due from CTDOT. Expenses for the month were in order. First Selectman Zeoli moved for acceptance of the Treasurer's Report. First Selectman Cofrancesco seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

4. Transportation Committee Report

Mayor Dickinson presented the Transportation Committee Report, found on pages 7-12 of the agenda packet. The resolution was found on pages 11-12 of the agenda packet.

Adopt Resolution Approving FY 2018-2021 TIP Amendment 24:

Mayor Dickinson moved for adoption. Kevin Alvarez seconded. All were in favor.

5. State Legislative Reports

Michael Muszynski from CCM stated that his office is continuously working on guidance documents regarding COVID-19. CRS funding may be used for unexpected expenditures. CCM has already released information on available COVID-19 grants. They are also currently working with a Police Accountability task force to come up with recommendations. Betsy Gara stated that House Democrats have polled members for a special session regarding issues such as police accountability, exclusionary zoning, and health disparities. They are currently discussing regulations requiring local police departments to deescalate situations before using force. First Selectman Michael Freda noted that OPM was not currently accepting new submissions for COVID-19 expenses after May 1. Betsy Gara stated that there would be another opportunity to submit costs after May 1.

6. Congressional Reports

Lou Mangini from Congresswoman DeLauro's office stated that Rosa is currently on her way to DC, voting on the Justice and Policing Act. She will be hosting a mayors meeting June 30 to discuss COVID/CARES Act funding. Lillian McKenzie from Senator Murphy's office reported on a funding opportunity from EPA on food waste reduction. The Senate has passed the Great American Outdoors Act to support federal lands. The HEROES Act, approved by the House, has still not been called for a vote in the Senate.

7. Budget Revision #3 – FY 2019-20

Executive Director Amento presented the proposed Budget Revision #3 for FY 2019-2020 budget, found on pages 13-14 of the agenda packet. The Executive Committee recommended approval of the proposed budget revision, which allows for reimbursement of SCRCOG's COVID-related expenses from OPM. First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion to approve the budget revision. Kevin Alvarez seconded the motion, and all voted in favor.

8. Resolution Authorizing SCRCOG Executive Director to Accept FY 2019-20 and FY 2020-21 Reimbursement from State of Connecticut for COVID-19-Related Expenses and for Work on Long-Term Recovery Plan

Executive Director Amento presented the resolution and related information, found on pages 15-25 of the agenda packet. The funding allows SCRCOG to provide leadership and support for the region's Long Term Recovery Plan. First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion to approve, and First Selectman Freda seconded. All voted in favor.

9. Resolution Authorizing SCRCOG Executive Director to Accept a FY 2020-21 Resilient CT Grant and to Execute a Research Sub-Award Agreement with CIRCA

Executive Director Amento presented the resolution found on pages 26-31 of the agenda packet. The Executive Committee recommended approval. First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion to approve, and First Selectman Freda seconded. All voted in favor.

10. SCRCOG Executive Director's Report

Executive Director Amento reported on working with OPM to obtain the award agreement for RSG by mid-July, expecting level funding from last fiscal year. It is unclear whether or not RPIP grants will be awarded. SCRCOG has been providing assistance on several grant applications, including a NFWF living shorelines project in Guilford, and USDA composting grant applications in West Haven and New Haven. The Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (ACIR) has been compiling information on municipal best practices and guidance on reopening town halls.

11. Grant Opportunities and Upcoming Events

Executive Director Amento stated that grant opportunities or upcoming events, if any, would be sent via email after the meeting.

12. REX Development Report

Ginny Kozlowski of REX Development reviewed the report on page 32 of the agenda packet. She has been working with businesses regarding reopening. Only 3,100 of the region's eligible businesses have gone through the reopening certification process. She is currently working with the Department of Labor to verify the accuracy of reports that 25,000 people have dropped out of the workforce. Additionally, REX has been tracking foreclosures and will be distributing a report soon. In the region, over 1,000 properties may soon be in foreclosure.

13. CTRides Report

Joanne Cavadini of CTRides reviewed the Quarterly Report attached to the agenda packet. She reported that changes have made to the Spring schedule due to the pandemic. They ran a successful series on teleworking and developed handouts.

14. DESPP/DEMHS Report

No representative from DESPP/DEMHS was present to make a report.

15. Regional Planning Commission June Action Table

The June Action Table was reviewed on page 33 of the agenda packet.

16. Regional Cooperation/Other Business

Mayor Dickinson stated there have been many cases of organizations misinterpreting the Governor's Emergency Orders. He encouraged everyone to be mindful of how they are interpreting the guidances.

17. Adjournment

Chairman Heller made a motion to adjourn, and First Selectman Cofrancesco seconded. The meeting was adjourned at 10:50 am.

Resolution

Authorizing the Executive Director to enter into agreements for FY 2020-21 Regional Services Grant-funded Consultant Services

Whereas: SCRCOG’s Regional Services Grant (RSG) Spending Plan for FY 2020-21 was adopted by the Council on May 24, 2020; and

Whereas: The RSG Spending Plan identifies programs and projects which are to be advanced by consultant services to complement SCRCOG staff efforts; and

Whereas: The RSG funding must be spent by June 30, 2021, and it is important to begin the new programs and projects as soon as possible and continue the ongoing programs and projects specified in the RSG Spending Plan; and

Whereas: The consultants for the Shared Services/Operations program should have municipal employment experience, as well as expertise in particular specialty areas of municipal government; and

Whereas: The SCRCOG By-Laws provide that “The Executive Director may at his/her discretion and under unusual circumstances, suggest that the Executive Committee consider only a single consultant possessing unique prerequisites, clearly establishing skills and background which might render “sole source” selection in the best interests of the Council”; and

Whereas: The SCRCOG RSG Spending and Work Plan explains the “unusual circumstances” of time constraints (the RSG funds must be spent by June 30, 2021) and the “unique prerequisites” (knowledge and experience in municipal government administration in particular subject areas) demonstrated by the skills and backgrounds of the proposed consultants; and

Whereas: The Executive Director proposes that the following consultants be engaged by SCRCOG for the work specified in the FY 2020-21 RSG Spending Plan:

Dear Chief Elected Officials of SCRCOG,

The implementation of Phase 2 shows a slow but steady increase in consumer confidence. To move the regional economy forward we continue to encourage the health guidelines and business support programs. While Connecticut is reporting a declining number of infections, hospitalizations and deaths, our residents have seen firsthand the deadly impact of this virus. As many states in the US are trending upwards, we know how quickly this virus can spread and want to take every precaution to prevent a resurgence here.

In an effort to get more residents safely out and about, we have been promoting not only the well-known state parks, but the trails created by the South Central Council of Governments. Ultimately, as people feel more comfortable enjoying our outdoor activities, our residents will begin to feel more comfortable with the idea of outdoor dining, shopping in stores that are adhering to the guidelines and we can move toward a greater integration of society.

Economically, one of the most critical issues we face moving forward is the opening (or not) of schools. Beyond the educational and social impacts on children, parents and guardians depend on a reliable school schedule to be able to work. As we move through the phases of reopening Connecticut, there will be inevitable increases in cases. The goal is to limit the spread of the virus (flattening the curve) so the region can establish a new equilibrium. The economic impact of the colleges and universities cannot be overstated. In terms of employment, capital investment and consumer spending, all of communities would be impacted by another semester of remote learning.

While Phase 3 has been placed on hold, we will support businesses that are open and businesses preparing to open in Phase 3. We will continue:

- Reinforcing the public health guidelines
- Building consumer confidence
- Promoting businesses that are open and can safely welcome patrons
- Distilling information for towns and other stakeholders to make it easier to navigate the system
- Disseminating timely and accurate data
- Documenting what we have learned and planning for a better future

Not ones to miss an opportunity, we are contacting real estate offices to provide Greater New Haven Visitors and Relocation Guides to their agents. While tourism demand is nil, we can certainly market the region as a great place to live and do business.

As await the new date for Phase 3, we will begin a new SWOT analysis with our public and private partners to identify short-term opportunities while we collectively envision a revised economic development strategy.
