1. <u>Call to order and Introductions</u>

Chairman Zeoli called the meeting to order at 10:03 a.m. All present introduced themselves.

2. Presentation: RPIP Cybersecurity Grant, Carl Fazzina from Novus Insight, Inc.

Carl Fazzina gave an overview of Novus Insight's services, and how it was vetted and selected as the preferred IT/Cybersecurity vendor by CRCOG, the Capitol Region Purchasing Council and COST. Carl discussed the RPIP Grant and the need to address cybersecurity deficiencies in our communities by means of a programmatic approach. He noted the cost of an average cyber breach and why a breach must be avoided. He advised there are challenges across the state and across the nation with attacks coming from foreign countries and private actors. Often, municipalities do not have sufficient funding and IT staffing and equipment resources to prevent or remediate gaps in their cybersecurity management and maintenance. Through a programmatic approach, SCRCOG and Novus have developed a comprehensive method of managing and enhancing a municipality's cybersecurity posture, and SCRCOG has obtained a \$2.2 million state grant to implement this program for its 15 towns on a regional, cost-effective scale. Carl advised the RPIP funding is in 5 phases over 4 years with a 50%

reimbursement. SCRCOG is the first region to implement such a program. To participate in the program, each municipality must undergo a thorough and confidential vulnerability assessment. Credit against the cost of the assessment will be given for previous assessments. He shared the assessment prices for small, medium, and large towns. The assessment will provide recommendations and an implementation plan for the next 4 years. At this point, the municipality can determine the extent of its participation in the implementation phase and its cost. The cost of implementation measures will be paid first by SCRCOG who will then seek 50% reimbursement from the state through the grant and 50% reimbursement from the town. There will be a meeting on November 21st at 10 am to review the cybersecurity assessment and protection program in greater detail, and it is important for each SCRCOG municipality to attend and have their questions answered,

Carl Fazzina advised that Novus will meet with each municipality individually to provide free estimates of the cost of the vulnerability assessment giving credits for prior assessments so that each municipality will be able to plan for its budgeting process.

3. Adopt Minutes of October 25, 2023 SCRCOG Meeting (motion)

First Selectwoman Lyons presented the minutes of the SCRCOG Meeting of October 25, 2023 which were included in the agenda packet on pages 2 - 6 and made a motion to adopt. First Selectman Cofrancesco seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

4. <u>Treasurer's Report for month ending October 27,2023 (motion)</u>

Chairman Zeoli referred to pages 7-9. Mayor Garrett reported there is \$3.1M in total assets of which \$1.3M is in cash and investments. There is \$530K due from the CTDOT and \$131K is due DEMHS. All expenses appear to be appropriate for a one-month period. The Executive Committee reviewed the audit for 2023 and is a clean audit. It will be made available to all the CEOs by email. Chairman Zeoli made a motion and First Selectman Cofrancesco seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Zeoli asked if there was any interest in having a presentation done from the State Treasurer of the STIF account. All were in favor.

5. MPO Business

a. <u>Adopt Resolution Authorizing Sole Source for Geographic Information System Consultant Services</u> (motion)

Deputy Director Francis advised that this is a resolution to continue the relationship with the current GIS vendor. First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion and Mayor Garrett seconded the motion. Motion approved unanimously.

b. <u>Adopt Resolution Authorizing Sole Source for Travel and Tourism Consultant Services (motion)</u>

Funds are appropriated from SCRCOG transportation funds each year to REX for travel and tourism services. Ginny Kozlowski thanked SCRCOG for their support. A motion was made by First Selectman Cofrancesco and seconded by Mayor Garrett. The motion was approved unanimously.

c. Deputy Director/Director of Transportation Report

Deputy Director Francis announced that Rebecca Andreucci will be leaving SCRCOG after 8 years of service and has accepted a position with the CTDOT in the Sustainability and Resiliency Department. Deputy Director Francis introduced Gabriel Filer, who was recently hired as the

SRCOG Transportation Project Manager. Francis then advised SCRCOG has been approved to start the Highway Safety Specialist Pilot Program. A temporary, full-time position will be posted with a grant-funded salary of \$60K for a Highway Safety Specialist.

d. <u>Transportation Staff Report</u>

Rebecca Andreucci reported there is an RFP posted for a Transportation Study.

Jim Rode reported on LOTCIP projects. Orange should be receiving a commitment to fund for their project. Branford has submitted the final design plans for the Main Street project. Guilford has received authorization to begin construction. Jim met with the DOT to discuss finances and was advised that the unallocated fund balance is \$67M. Beginning next year, the focus will be to identify projects to utilize these funds. Jim advised that all information regarding transportation funding opportunities are on the SCRCOG website. Deputy Director Francis advised there is an urgency to retire that surplus. SCRCOG and DOT would like to see this program expanded, but DOT is reluctant until further progress is made on retiring the surplus. Francis stated SCRCOG will be aggressive in using the program and will offer technical assistance to SCRCOG towns on their project funding applications. Kevin Tedesco advised that the DOT is looking to see if there is a gap between the TIP and LOTCIP. Jim shared examples of what is eligible: any road project, bridges with a span of over 20 feet, stand-alone sidewalks, bike paths, and recreational trails.

e. Greater New Haven Transit District Report

Mario Marrero reported they have completed a training class of 5 new drivers. There will be 3 more classes. Trips remain steady with 12,000 trips in New Haven; 6,500 in Hamden; 3,200 in West Haven and 2,800 trips in North Haven. Mario advised DOT has decided that the Transit District should move to the North Haven location. The re-location of the agency will be completed by 2027.

6. COG Business

a. SCRCOG Budget Revision #4 FY23 (motion)

Finance Director Rappa explained the revisions to the budget. First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion to approve and Mayor Garrett seconded the motion. Motion approved unanimously.

b. Calendar Year 2024 Meeting Calendar Approval (motion)

First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion to approve and Mayor Garrett seconded the motion. Motion approved unanimously.

c. Preliminary FY 2024-2025 Municipal SCRCOG Dues (motion)

Chairman Zeoli advised this was discussed in the Executive Committee meeting and the Executive Committee felt the one cent increase from 42 cents per person to 43 cents was more desirable than a large one-time increase later. First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion to approve option 2 and Mayor Garrett seconded the motion. Motion approved unanimously.

d. Appointment of Nominating Committee (motion)

Executive Director Amento advised that Chairman Zeoli needed to pick 3 people for the n Nominating Committee. Chairman Zeoli asked if there were any volunteers. First Selectman Hoey, First Selectman Freda and Mayor Garrett volunteered. First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion to approve and Mayor Garrett seconded the motion. Motion approved unanimously.

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e. FY2023-2024 RSG Spending Plan Amendment #3 (motion)

Executive Director Amento explained the amendment proposed to the RSG Spending Plan referring to page 20 of the attached. First Selectman Cofrancesco made a motion to approve and Mayor Garrett seconded the motion. Motion approved unanimously.

f. Executive Director's Report

Executive Director Amento shared that SCRCOG is still in negotiations with DEEP regarding a grant to assist SCRCOG with the formation of a Regional Waste Authority.

g. SCRCOG Newsletter

h. Regional Planning Staff Report

Ben Lovejoy described SCRCOG's hosting of a 4-hour Land Use Training which was required of all Municipal Land Use Commissioners. Ben also noted that SCRCOG is working on updating the Public Participation Guidelines. There is a meeting today with the Housing Working Group to discuss inclusionary zoning and the tour they hosted last month. Ben is also working on an RFP to update the Regional Housing Plan. Ben stated the CPRG \$1M planning grant which SCRCOG was awarded has a deliverable, the Primary Climate Action Plan (PCAP) due on March 1st. The PCAP document needs to be referenced for any regional applications for CPRG implementation grants aimed at reducing harmful greenhouse gas emissions. Ben sent an email to all CEOs and Assistants with 3 questions to solicit ideas on emission reduction projects. Ben does need to report to the EPA that opportunities for input were given to all municipalities in the region. Chairman Zeoli asked if a dehumidification system for the community pool that costs approximately \$1M would fall under this. Ben explained the application would have to quantify the potential reduction of gas emissions and improve energy efficiency to be eligible

i. **<u>REX Development Report</u>**

Ginny advised Commissioner Alexandra Daum is stepping down and will become the Associate Vice President for New Haven Affairs and University Properties. Daniel Keefe will become the new Commissioner of Economic and Community Development.

j. Congressional Report

Lou Mangini advised the CTDOT has made great progress in moving projects funded by the Infrastructure Bill. The House did pass a continuing resolution and it is expected the Senate will take that up which would leave the current funding amounts in place until mid-January.

k. State Legislative Reports - CCM, COST

Betsy Gara noted that in the Legislative process there are several task forces and working groups that were created and COST is paying close attention to those. The task force looking at teacher pensions being transferred to towns has not been convened. The Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations met regarding a mandated study on possible consolidation of Metropolitan Planning Organizations. This is a study that was created pursuant to Special Act 23-13 looking at developing recommendations for the possible consolidation of MPOs. The Majority Leader's Affordable Housing Roundtable has convened to look at issues relative to affordable housing. There was a meeting on Monday looking at repealing the car tax. Betsy also mentioned there is a group looking at the State Historic Preservations Officer's role in administering historic preservation review

processes. If you have any feedback on any of these issues, please email Betsy (bgara@ctcost.org). COST is looking for input from the towns to see if the processes involved needs to be streamlined or made more transparent. COST is paying close attention to the PFAS litigation regarding wells and soil. Deputy Director Francis asked what Betsy knew about PFAS settlement funds. Betsy stated the PFAS settlement funds are regarding litigation against Dupont and 3M and is specific to water utilities. Towns that have a water utility need to decide by Dec 4th or Dec. 11th depending on the particular settlement whether to opt out of the settlement. If you are part of the settlement, it forecloses any further litigation against Dupont and 3M. If you are seeing high detection rates of PFAS contamination, you may not want to be in the settlement. Deputy Director Francis asked what are the ramifications if you do nothing. Betsy explained that if you do nothing then you are part of the settlement, and she recommends you discuss this whole issue further with legal counsel. 7. <u>Regional Cooperation/Other Business</u>

First Selectman Hoey stated he is looking forward to the presentation from Novus but stated he has some concerns with overlaps with things that have been done and how Novus's best practices are different from those of CISA (Cypersecurity Infrastructure Security Agency) being that CISA is the national model. Ben Lovejoy explained that the Novus assessments are consistent but more comprehensive than the National Guard and CISA assessments. Credit in cost of the Novus assessment will be given the municipality if it has gone through a recent CISA or National Guard assessment. Selectman Hoey stated this can be a check and balance on his IT team to make sure they answered the CISA questions appropriately. Hoey also asked why funding for Risk Management was reduced in the RSG Spending Plan, and an additional \$8,400 was added to Novus. Executive Director Amento explained that additional cost was for increased free cyberawareness training of municipal employees. Hoey then asked if grant funds could only be spent through Novus. Ben responded yes as to the vulnerability assessments. However, Ben said that he believes implementation projects can be sourced through any other vendor so long as it is consistent with the overall regional program. Ben indicated that he would clarify the matter further and that contract language was still being formulated. Hoey wanted to confirm if everyone agrees to move forward with NOVUS which is a \$4M contract over 4 years with a 50% match. The Board members responded affirmatively.

8. Adjournment

Chairman Zeoli made a motion to adjourn. First Selectman Cofrancesco seconded. The meeting was adjourned at 11:34 a.m.

Report to SCRCOG Board on Community Housing Conversations Project Ben Fink, January 2024

Background

The SCRCOG Community Housing Conversations project started in October 2022. Its goal: to build as broad and diverse a base as possible to support expanded housing options in our municipalities, inclusive of residents with varying experience and perspectives on housing, working in tandem with municipal governments implementing their affordable housing plans.

The specific process of the project varies necessarily based on each municipality's assets, wants, needs, and other characteristics. But the basic sequence is as follows:

- 1. Initial planning meeting(s) with initial contacts in municipal government, often CEO and/or planner, to establish a relationship, get common understanding of the project, and determine the municipality's interests in participating.
- 2. Broader planning meeting(s) with a larger group of residents from government, business, and community organizations, including power mapping: sketching out where people in town gather as neighbors, and how we can connect with them.
- 3. Connecting with leaders in these places people with or without official positions, who have the trust of their neighbors and working together to plan small informal gatherings where neighbors share their housing experiences, wants, and needs.
- 4. Local gatherings where those housing experiences, wants, and needs are shared. The emphasis is on sharing our own stories and experiences, and listening to others', with a minimum of technical talk, to keep the focus on finding common ground as residents.
- 5. Follow-up meetings of the planning group, to debrief community conversations, plan more, reflect on what we've learned, build skills, and plan next steps.
- 6. Town-wide gatherings and collaboration: participants in these local gatherings will then be invited to meet together in carefully facilitated wider gatherings, focused on *education*, building shared understanding about housing policy and possibilities; and *cocreation*, building an agenda for increased housing options that all participants take part in and support.

Meanwhile, SCRCOG staff and consultants facilitate ongoing shared cross-town collaboration and knowledge-building:

- Internal planning meetings, to continually evaluate progress toward the project's goals, make adjustments as needed, and plan next steps.
- Skills trainings with municipal government representatives, residents of municipalities, and others who are or might become involved in the project, to build knowledge and abilities and relationships across towns.
- Cross-town strategy meetings, starting once the local work is established and running in several towns, which will allow municipal government and community leaders to collaborate and build shared strategy together across towns, and eventually region-wide.

Successes

- As of mid-December 2023, about 25 community housing conversations have taken place in five municipalities: Guilford, Hamden, Madison, Wallingford, and Woodbridge, in addition to one in Orange, organized by the Woodbridge housing committee and including residents of several neighboring SCRCOG municipalities. Conversations have taken place in churches, synagogues, libraries, senior centers, ethnic organizations, government committees, neighbors' houses, and on at least one town green.
- Initial planning meetings are currently underway in Meriden and North Branford, and are planned for early 2024 in Bethany, New Haven, and Orange. SCRCOG staff and consultants are also in contact with representatives from East Haven, Milford, North Haven, and West Haven, who are still considering the right time to begin.
- Each of the five currently active municipalities Guilford, Hamden, Madison, Wallingford, and Woodbridge — has organized a working group, composed of municipal and community representatives, that meets to plan and reflect on community conversations, and to consider next steps toward acting on conversations' findings.
- Community conversations have begun to yield concrete next steps. Residents across lines of age, race/ethnicity, and socioeconomic class are discovering common ground in the need for more housing options, including more affordable housing options, for the people they know and care about. Participants in community housing conversations have begun appearing at municipal meetings including community feedback sessions and planning and zoning commission meetings, where they have testified to the need for increased housing options and helped approval of loosened ADU regulations, inclusionary zoning, and new housing developments.
- Community conversations are also leading to increased collaboration across town lines, including a December meeting of town planners and related officials to learn about policy options for increased housing diversity and affordability.
- Community conversations are beginning to be facilitated by residents themselves, using the skills built in local planning meetings and an ongoing series of SCRCOG-sponsored trainings, which have included representatives from the majority of SCRCOG municipalities as well as guests from as far as Hartford.

Challenges

- This work takes a long time to yield results, and it does not follow a linear path. With all the urgent needs facing our towns, it is easy to lose sight of the long-term benefits of a broader and more diverse group of residents making their voices and perspectives heard.
- The process of holding open-ended conversations to share experiences and perspectives

 prior to sharing specific information or getting feedback about a specific development
 can feel counterintuitive. Ongoing education and mutual learning are a key part of the work.

- Facilitating community conversations can be intimidating. It is important to continue building residents' skills and supplementing them with SCRCOG staff and consultant support.
- Every municipality is different. There is no one-size-fits-all. The work must be planned, evaluated, and adjusted according to each municipality's assets, needs, and wants, if it is to be effective and sustainable.

Status of Subcontractors / Budget

- Three experienced local facilitators have been engaged as potential subcontractors, to facilitate community conversations. All three have received initial training and have observed a community conversation. One (Sarah Bromley of Milford) has now co-facilitated a community conversation, the final step in the training, and is fully trained and ready to facilitate on her own and be compensated out of the \$15,000 budget line. The other two (Jennie Rice of Seymour and Rachel Merva of Milford) still need to complete this final step, at which point they will also be fully trained and ready.
- As of yet, no funds from the \$15,000 budget line have been spent. This is primarily due to two reasons: (1) a slowdown in the number of community conversations in towns where residents have requested help facilitating, primarily Wallingford and Woodbridge; and (2) local residents and committee members of some towns starting to step up and facilitate community conversations themselves, primarily in Guilford and Madison.
- It will be important to know soon whether more municipalities will avail themselves of the opportunity to participate in this program in the coming months, and from there to make a choice about possibly reprogramming some of these funds.



CLIMATE POLLUTION REDUCTION GRANT

SCRCOG has been awarded a grant of \$1 million from the EPA to create Climate Action Plans through the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant (CPRG) Program and SCRCOG will function as project lead for the New Haven-Milford region over the four (4) year project period. SCRCOG will be collaborating with the Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments (NVCOG) to create three distinct Climate Action Plans that offer recommendations for how the region can lower Greenhouse Gases (GHG) though a variety of policies and projects. A primary focus of the grant program is to also offer direct solutions designed to improve air quality, create jobs, and ensure the region's low income and disadvantaged communities are prioritized as solutions are created. CT Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security and Sub applicants for FEMA HMA and BRIC

The fiscal year 2023 funding opportunities for two FEMA Hazard Mitigation Assistance grant programs are now posted. For this grant cycle, \$800 million is available for the Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) grant program and the \$1 billion is available to the Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant program. Educational Forums

SCRCOG is coordinating its efforts with NVCOG to provide educational forums to citizens in both regions on food waste diversion, unit-based MSW disposal, recycling and composting. SCRCOG & NVCOG have begun the hosting of two separate forums that will inform municipal staff and elected officials on the implementation and successes of Organics Diversion & Unit-Based Pricing (UBP) Programs. The two-part forum includes one event for UBP Transfer station users and another event for curbside UBP programs.

The Forums will include an informational presentation, along with a panel of waste reduction personnel who will share their experiences on how they have operated and implemented Organics Diversion and UBP programs in their communities.

These forums follow the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection's (DEEP) efforts to address Connecticut's shrinking waste capacity by reducing waste. Organics Diversion and UBP programs are being piloted in 15 Connecticut towns through grant funds from the Sustainable Materials Management (SMM) Grant program provided by DEEP.



CYBERSECURITY PROGRAM

SCRCOG OPM \$2,220,066 Regional Performance Incentive Program (RPIP) Cybersecurity Grant

This grant will fund a 4 -year cybersecurity assessment and protection program provided on a regional basis and available to all 15 SCRCOG municipalities. The grant will establish a new full-time equivalent Virtual Chief Information Security Office and a Security Operations Center, as well as a regional program to pool services and resources, achieve volume pricing on products and services, and facilitate sharing of best practices. The program will help protect SCRCOG municipalities from the substantial costs of cyberattacks, while reducing cyber-insurance premium costs. SCRCOG and the Cybersecurity Consultant, Novus Insight, hosted meetings with representatives of SCRCOG municipalities on November 21 and December 13.

SCRCOG will continue to provide free KnowBe4 simulated phishing training for any interested municipal employees in the region. This is a very effective year-long active training program. Currently, 2,050 municipal employees in our region are involved in the training. If your town has not implemented this program, and you have an interest, please let us know. We have another 2,000 spaces available to begin additional municipal employee training. Additionally, SCRCOG staff recently began their KnowBe4 training.

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING

Unified Planning Work Program Update

In November SCRCOG published an RFQ seeking consultant support for five transportation planning studies included in the UPWP for FY24 and FY25. Six firms were interviewed on December 6, 2023, and the selection committee chose the following firms.

- The Guilford Town Center Traffic Study VHB
- The Northford Center Connectivity Study BL
- The Congestion Management Process Study Update- VN
- The Regional Freight Study VN
- The Regional Mobility Study for Aging and Disabled Community VN

Following CTDOT and SCRCOG board approvals, these studies will be ready to begin in February 2024.

Local Transportation Capital Improvement Program (LOTCIP) Update

- In December, SCRCOG began to offer consultant support for LOTCIP applications.
 BETA Group is working with the town engineer in North Branford to complete a LOTCIP Application for project #L098-001 Twin Lakes Rd Reconstruction.
- New Haven has submitted final design plans for 2 projects. L092-005 Water Street Cycle Track project and L092-007 the Valley Street Project. Both projects were submitted to CTDOT and awaiting comment.
- West Haven submitted an updated LOTCIP application for the Front Avenue Culvert Project. The application packet was reviewed and sent to CTDOT.

Other Programs

The 11th Edition of the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) is Now Available.

On December 19, 2023, a final rule adopting the 11th Edition of the *Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways*—the MUTCD—was published in the *Federal Register.* The new MUTCD includes updates to improve safety for pedestrians, bicyclists, and all road users.

States must adopt the 11th Edition National MUTCD or have a State MUTCD or Supplement that is in substantial conformance with the National MUTCD as their legal State standard for traffic control devices within two years. The *Federal Register* notice, which provides detailed discussion of the final dispositions of major changes from the 2009 Edition, can be viewed at <u>https://www.federalregister.gov/d/2023-27178</u>. Route 146 Corridor Management Plan

The Connecticut Department of Transportation (CTDOT) has partnered with the consulting firm VHB to develop a Corridor Management Plan (CMP) for CT Route 146 in Branford and Guilford. The purpose of creating a CMP is to review the Route 146 corridor and how to protect its many historical, cultural, and environmental resources. The CMP will balance caring for these important resources with providing a safe roadway for all travelers and respecting the desires of the community, residents, and local businesses. It will also look at ways to make the corridor more resilient—more prepared for climate risks like flooding. Laura Francis, Deputy Director/Director of Transportation Planning, serves on the working group as a representative of the region. The final Route 146 Corridor Management Plan will include a list of strategies that should be pursued to preserve and protect the intrinsic and unique qualities of the Route 146 Corridor for years to come. Your feedback is important for the working group to know if the plan is on the right track and represents the goals of the community and users. Automated Enforcement Safety Devices (ATESDs)

The Connecticut Department of Transportation (CTDOT) released a guidance document pursuant to <u>Public Act 23-116</u> (Act), for those municipalities that elect to use Automated Enforcement Safety Devices (ATESDs), such as red light and speed safety cameras, in their communities. The document includes guidance on the plan development, criteria, and application submission as required by the Act.

The guideline document is intended to be a living document, and the Department will consider amending it to address any future difficulties or concerns that municipalities may have. The guidance, as well as more information regarding automated traffic enforcement safety devices, will also be accessible at <u>Automated Traffic Enforcement Safety Device Program (ct.gov)</u>. The Public Act does not provide a mandate for municipalities to install these devices, but rather,

they must opt-in with a vote of their legislative body. The Public Act requires the guidance be consistent with the goals of installing traffic enforcement safety devices in locations where they are likely to improve traffic safety and ensuring that the distribution of the devices throughout the municipality is equitable.

AROUND THE TOWNS

Congratulations to New Haven for receiving funding from the CT Department of Economic and Community Development's (DECD) Brownfield Remediation and Development Program. This funding is intended to support the remediation and assessment of blighted properties so that they can be redeveloped and put back into productive use to support economic growth.

New Haven is receiving two grants for remediation:

- \$990,000 grant to perform soil remediation, excavation, and disposal of impacted soils on the 0.8-acre parcel located at 265 South Orange Street (formerly home to the New Haven Veterans Memorial Coliseum). This will enable the construction of a 277,435 sq. ft. Class A life sciences and tech office building.
- \$995,600 grant to abate and demolish the four vacant and dilapidated buildings on the 1.73-acre site located at 10 Liberty Street. The cleanup work will enable the construction of a five-story, 150-unit affordable housing complex.

Transit is a Trip Campaign

During the first few weeks of this quarter, we approved three new "Man on the Street" videos to be used on TikTok. We also reviewed and adjusted our media plan based on performance analytics and went over the monthly performance metrics and stats with both Cashman & Katz, the media agency on this project, and the CTDOT.

By August, we had reviewed the final campaign data with our media agency and collected the native files from the creative agency. Additionally, our organic social media posts continued as planned.

Drive Less Connecticut Climate Challenge

After creating a DLC poll in the previous quarter, a reminder email was sent to CT*rides* members who were active in 2023 to garner more responses. A total of 196 responses were received, which will be used to help improve our 2024 Challenge.

CT*rides*.com

The CT*rides* website underwent multiple updates during the quarter. The "About" section's copy has been updated, and the Gold Star Memorial Bridge Shuttle page was removed from the website. The list of schools participating in the U-Pass CT program were updated to reflect the consolidation of all Connecticut community colleges under the name "CT State Community College." The Middletown Area Transit and Estuary Transit District/9 Town were replaced with their new consolidated name River Valley Transit on the Commuting Options page. Additionally, the Emergency Ride Home list was updated to include the Connecticut Office of the Treasurer, the Connecticut Department of Administrative Services, and St. Mary's Hospital.

CTrides News Roundup

Three monthly editions of CT*rides* News Roundup were created and distributed. The July edition included content about the CTDOT Customer Experience Action Plan, the federal grants to bolster public transit systems in CT, Transit is a Trip campaign promotion and for having our campaign selected as a Silver Telly Award Winner, take the train to Sailfest in New London, and the e-bike incentive program.

The August edition included the return of battery electric buses, explore Hartford by bike, "Kids on Track" job fair, and the Greater

Bridgeport Transit Authority grant of \$450,000 for service improvements.

Lastly, the September edition included new ways to purchase a 31-day CT*transit* and CT*fastrak* bus passes, the new rail cars coming to CT's commuter rail lines, U-Pass CT promotion, Greater Bridgeport Transit expands bus service, e-bike conversion kits for Bridgeport residents, and CTDOT embraces complete street design criteria. Finally, the development and sourced content for the next quarter began.

Along the Lines Podcast

During this quarter, three episodes were recorded (37-39) and two episodes (36-37) were released, the Along the Lines message for the big board at New Haven Union Station was updated and is awaiting CTDOT approval, and the descriptions on Libsyn, Soundcloud, Google Podcasts, and other platforms were updated to reflect the new host. By the end of the quarter, the podcast had 8,969 downloads.

Electric Bus Graphics

Design specs and layouts for the logo placement on new electric buses for CT*transit*, River Valley Transit, Milford, and UConn were prepared. Additionally, the logos for Milford Transit District were recreated in lieu of having the original artwork.

Hartford Union Station Selfie Station


An initial project strategy document was sent to the Greater Hartford Transit District. Feedback was received and changes, including photo examples, were made. No response was received by the end of the quarter.

CTrail Hartford Line Mailer Redesign

Updates to the Hartford Line brochure were finalized, and the mailers were sent during the week of July 17th.

Hartford Line Map

The CT*rail* Hartford Line map was updated to include Enfield stations, and multiple posters were printed and delivered to CTDOT.

Mohegan Sun Cross-Marketing

In July, a custom poster was created to promote the CT*rail* Shore Line East and the free shuttle connection to the casino. The poster was sent to CTDOT and the casino for review, and feedback was provided. After making requested changes, the final poster was sent to CTDOT and was approved. It was then shared with the Mohegan Sun marketing contact for distribution.

Social Media

The team posted social media content across the CT*rides*, CT*rail* Hartford Line, CT*rail* Shore Line East, and CT*fastrak* accounts, which includes Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, LinkedIn, and TikTok (CT*rides* only).

A total of 181 posts were published through CT*rides* various platforms during this quarter. Posts included the Transit is a Trip campaign, CT bike trails, ParkConneCT campaign, Pay-per-mile car insurance article, Customer Experience Action Plan, CT*rides* Outreach highlights, U-Pass CT promotion, battery electric buses are back in CT, Along the Lines podcast promotion, Transit Takes, GBT bus service expansion, sustainable travel options in CT, Transit app, DominGO! Hartford, World Car Free Day, Rail Safety Week, and sustainable transportation and climate change. The total impressions were 10,870,221, with 6,765 engagements and an engagement rate of 6.04%. This represents the following changes from the last quarter, -37.8%, -8.5%, and +8.4%, respectively. Lastly, the CT*rides* TikTok account received a total of 24,968 video views and 41 new followers.

For CT*fastrak*, 103 posts were published on Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter. Some of the posts included events near the stations, station highlights, Transit is a Trip promotion, short-term parking lot closure notices, fare prices, World Car Free Day, fast lane and Transit App promotion. The total impressions were 181,255, with 3,412 engagements and an engagement rate of 4.84%. This represents the








Ridematching and Rewards
